Diabetes Mellitus in Pregnancy Why do we care about diabetes in Pregnancy?

What is Diabetes Mellitus?

- Chronic diseases in which there is abnormally high level of glucose in blood (hyperglycemia).
- Insulin hormone produced by the pancreas
- Allows the cells of our body to take up glucose to use as energy
- Insulin is either not produced in sufficient amounts or our cells do not respond to the insulin therefore there is poor uptake of glucose

Diabetes in Jamaica

• Approximately 11.9% of Jamaicans 15 years or older have Diabetes Mellitus (9% men and 14.6% women). 1 in 9 persons. Prevalence increases with age

Diabetes in Pregnancy

- Pregestational Diabetes Mellitus diabetes prior to pregnancy
- Gestational Diabetes Mellitus diabetes during pregnancy. Asymptomatic and Symphonic are symptoms

Gestational Diabetes Mellitus... Who is at risk?

- Risk assessment at doctor visit.
- Women older than 35 yrs
- Obesity (BMI above 30kg/m2)
- Previous Gestational Diabetes
- Family History/First Degree Relative with Diabetes

Antenatal Management aim is tight glucose control to decrease risk.

Truth is..... most pregnancies' are unplanned

Maternal Complications

- End organ dysfunction (pre existing Diabetes)
- Development of Hypertension and pre Eclampsia in Pregnancy
- Operative Delivery
- Development of Diabetes Mellitus (Long Term Consequences)

Fetal Complications

- Misaccariage
- Congenital Abnormalities
- Small for Gestational Age
- Large for Gestational Age/Macrosomia
- Difficult deliver; shoulder dystocia
- Hypoglycemia after deliver
- Stillbirth

Have you ever stopped to really notice that there are a plethora of ailments that 'run' in families? - Bloating or swelling in the lower abdomen
- Back or leg pain
- Bowel or bladder dysfunction
- Constipation, diarrhea, and rectum discomfort

For years, the standard method of care for fibroids included surgical procedures such as a hysterectomy and myomectomy. In some cases, they still are the right treatment. But in today's world of evolving technology, it is always wise to seek a second opinion and be advised on other options.

Most women don't realize that there are less invasive options to free them from their fibroid pain. Rather than remove fibroids, UFE uses interventional radiology and tiny particles to non-invasively block the blood flow to uterine fibroids. Each mode has 10 levels as words progressively get larger towards the end. Each Level has 15 or more words to learn. The words of a particular level are the same words for each mode.

In Settings, the Student can enter their name, age, parish and school. They can select from Learning Mode 1, Learning Mode 2 or Competition Mode.

Learning Mode 1:

Students can learn to spell a word by taping each letter in the word, from left to right, (from the first letter to the last). The KCNK Little Bee app says the name of the letter out loud so the children can say along. If the student makes a mistake, they can tap on the mistake to undo it. If the student wants to hear the word again, they can tap on the little bee at the top left of the screen.

In this mode the student has to spell correctly each word to move on to the next word, and correctly spell all words to complete the level. The student can redo any level at any time. Students must complete early levels before starting later levels.

Learning Mode 2:

Students are given the letters of each word in jumbled (mixed up) fashion, and are asked to spell the called word correctly. If the student makes a mistake, they can tap on the mistake to undo it. If the student wants to hear the word again, they can tap on the little bee at the top left of the screen. In this mode the student has to spell correctly each word to move on to the next word, and correctly spell all words to complete the level. The student can redo any level at any time. Students must complete early levels before starting later levels.



Competition Mode:

Students are given the letters of each word in jumbled (mixed up) fashion, with extra letters added (thrown in) and are asked to spell the called word correctly. The student is timed for each word, and each time is added to their total for the level. Students are given 10 random words from the pool of words for the level. Students should aim to complete each level in the shortest amount of time possible. The leader board (main page) shows how much time was spent on each level.

Students can reset the game and start again on the Settings page. While playing, students should wait until a letter has been finish being called before selecting the next letter. Students and Parents can feel free to screen capture their leader board to send to their teachers.




